It feels like only yesterday but – truth be told - it was May of 2006 when this beautiful, intimate theatre first opened its doors to the community.

In those heady days of the Celtic Tiger the belief was that you could do no wrong. That rawness and energy helped to fuel the passion and ambition that still sits at the core of the DLR Mill Theatre.

Our opening night brought the President of Ireland, Mary McAleese in to wish us a safe journey. To mark the occasion, we opened with Thornton Wilder's *Our Town*, a play that captures the essence of what theatre is all about. The actors were a collaborative team of professionals and local community groups working together. We went on to launch the premier of Irvine Welsh's *Babylon Heights* and then on to rub shoulders with Hollywood's glitterati Jerry Hall and David Soul in *Love Letters*.

It is this mix of ambition, enthusiasm and momentum that forms the core of what The Mill Theatre is about. A mix that has helped us forge deep relationships with the local groups and communities; that has empowered us to create an education partnership with schools across the country and bring Shakespeare closer to junior and leaving cert students; a mix that inspires us to present something different and unique to audiences, like our production of *Eclipsed* - Patricia Burke Brogan's powerful account of a Magdalene laundry in the 1960s.

The Mill Theatre has been running on full power since its inception - bursting with creativity and energy. The day-to-day success is down to the passion and expertise that the staff bring to their individual roles. That coupled with the initiative, drive and direction of our theatre manager, Kate Canning, has guided the theatre through these very hard times.

I would also like to say, as we stand on the edge of change, a big thank you to my selfless fellow board members, they have always been there for the overall good of the theatre.

In closing, the overall thank you has to go out to all of our audiences and local communities. The theatre was created for you. You have come, volunteered and enjoyed. Thank you.



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HEATRE

The Mill Theatre was officially opened by President Mary McAleese in May 2006. The development of the Mill Theatre by Dundrum Town Centre was thanks to the work of a small group of committed local people. The Mill Theatre was leased at a peppercorn rent to The Mill Theatre Management CLG, and this company now manages and programmes The Mill for the benefit of the wider community.

DunLaoghaire Rathdown has a long tradition of great community and amateur drama, and the Mill has become a home to many drama groups from Dundrum, Glencullen, Sandyford, Balally, Rathfarnham, Churchtown, Taney, Rathgar and Kilmacud.

Over the years the Mill's small staff board of trustees have served to bring people together both on and offstage. It has become a home for the many local amateur drama groups, the stage schools, the exemplary and award winning work for primary and secondary schools, for professional touring performers, local artists and – more recently – for a vibrant and popular youth theatre. The Mill has hosted European and Irish premiers and continues to host a number of high-profile plays, musicals and solo acts in the setting of a 200-seater intimate theatre.

The Mill Theatre, since its opening in 2006, has supported amateur companies to realise their full artistic potential, built significant relationships across the community in all branches of the performing arts and provided an alternative meeting space for local and national businesses. It has developed a programme of events that encompasses all the arts and appeals to people of all ages not only from within the local community but from the wider city.

The theatre was renamed The DLR Mill Theatre in 2016 in honour of the ongoing strategic relationship with Dun Laoghaire Rathdown County Council, and to mark the hard work and dedication of the Mill's staff, board, and volunteers. The Mill has outgrown its origin and is now an essential part of a strategic commitment to county wide access to quality arts experiences for everybody.
